Robins class made rocky road biscuits in cookery. Here they are concentrating hard to measure out three tablespoons of golden syrup.






Lower Kindergarten News

Reception Woodpeckers 'Wild Woods'



Woodpeckers had their first Wild Woods session last week. On the way to the school's woodland area the children were challenged to count 10 acorns into their egg box; they then used these, along with other natural materials, to make potions in the Wild Woods. Some of the potions turned the teachers into monsters!

The children used their physical skills and explored changes in materials when digging in the mud pits, making mud pies and mark making on the chalk logs. Some of the children also used the construction materials to build a train track. The children have learnt how to keep safe in the Wild Woods and had great fun.



On Thursday 19 September, Year 6 were invited to St Edmund's College for a taster day. At arrival, pupils were warmly welcomed and were given a 'run-through' of the day's activities. Their mission was to decipher a secret message; this was very challenging but most pupils managed to break the code.

Pupils developed their observational skills and produced a pencil sketch of one of the monarchs in the style of a Tudor artist. Year 4C PSHE Drama
