#### Instrumental Showcase Concert

So, at 6.00pm, dressed in their concert finery, the students performed solos and duets on the piano, recorder, violin, flute, drum kit, guitar and ukulele.

A few nerves were visible but all played their very best and demonstrated the fruits of diligent practice. Many thanks to our wonderful peripatetic music teachers who guide and instruct the children and well done to mums, dads, grandparents, relatives and friends who listen and encourage each week.

## Earth Day Assembly

We joined the world in celebrating Earth Day on 22 April, to raise awareness of the issues our planet is facing, and of course to promote ways that we can all help. Across the school we looked at various environmental concerns and potential solutions, from climate change to saving water to the degradation of our planet's soil.

In the Earth Day assembly, the children learned about the significant role that soil plays in stabilising Earth's climate, and the urgent need to protect and regenerate it. Year 3 performed a poem they helped to write in their Science lesson entitled "SOS - Save our Soil", and everyone left feeling hopeful and determined that we would do our best to ensure the way we live and the choices we make will help rather than harm the Earth. We learned



that by educating ourselves and choosing businesses that work sustainably and solicitously, we can help to protect and conserve our planet.

## **KS1 Football Club**

KS1 football club have been practicing a number of different football skills including dribbling, passing, shooting and defending. At the end of a session the children play a match to put into practice what they have learnt.

In shooting practice, the children have been doing a mini penalty game to see who can score the most goals!



## **Lower Kindergarten**

This terms topic in Lower Kindergarten has been all about 'The Farm'. The children learnt all about scarecrows and how they scare the birds away from eating all the farmer's seeds. They also learnt the song 'Dingle Dangle Scarecrow'

The children then had the opportunity to create their own scarecrow using shapes, different materials and felt tip pens.

The children loved exploring our farm sensory tray filled with soil, fake grass and our small world farm.



Maths—Lower Kindergarten were shown a tray filled with different objects including stickle bricks, play food, wooden bricks and flat shapes. They were then shown an object which was shaped like a circle and asked if they could find all the objects which were the same shape. They then moved onto triangle, square and rectangle. If the children found this activity difficult they were asked to find the objects by colour. This activity enabled the teachers to see whether the children could categorise objects in different ways. Well done Lower Kindergarten!








The children in Lower Kindergarten took turns to throw some beanbags into a basket. They then had to count how many they got in the basket and then write down on a blackboard the amount by 'writing' lines. This activity reinforced the children's counting skills as well as introducing the concept of creating marks to represent numbers. The children seemed to love the game, waited patiently for their turn and 'wrote' down their amounts independently.







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#### **Author Neal Zetter visit**

Oaklands were privileged to host a special guest called Neal Zetter on Thursday 12 May.

It was wonderful to meet Neal in person. He is a well-known comedy performance poet, who has written entertaining and uplifting poetry aimed at children as well as adults.

The children were entertained in his class assembly where he performed a few of his poems. Neal also hosted a workshop for a number of classes, where he focused on different poetic features in his own work followed by the children writing a class or their own poems. Some of the children were given the opportunity to perform their own work to their class. The younger children loved being able to ask Neal questions about his career and his love for poetry.

## **Upper Kindergarten practicing for Sports Day**

The children in Upper Kindergarten have begun practicing for our upcoming Sports Day. They also practised staying in their lanes during a running race and finally, took part in a bat and beanbag race. All the children had great fun, cheering each other on!





## **Upper Kindergarten**

The children in Upper Kindergarten have been taking part in a variety of activities to help develop their problem solving skills. The children were asked questions to encourage them to think about how things might work and what they could do to make things work better. Some children had to try and rescue the dinosaurs by breaking the ice, whilst others used guttering to build ramps to work out how to make the cars move faster. Wonderful problem solving!









## **Reception Owls**

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During a conversation about what toys Owls would like to play with the following week, a few children asked for playdough. We decided to allow them to help make some. The children helped to add food colouring and turmeric to create both yellow and red playdough. Glitter was also added to most of them. We also tried to make

blue playdough using blue tea although this was not very effective; perhaps we needed a stronger brew!

The children had great fun using rolling pins and different cutters to manipulate the dough. A great success and, at the request of the children, one to be repeated very soon.







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## **Reception Robins**

Inspired by the fruit and vegetable faces painted by the artist Arcimboldo, Robins class used different fruit and vegetables to make their own faces. Then they carefully drew their face and mixed paint to paint their own portrait just like

## **Reception Woodpeckers**

Woodpeckers have enjoyed exploring their new topic, 'Changes', by using experiments to identify different changes. They have started to compare reversible and irreversible changes. When investigating reversible changes, Woodpeckers looked at how water can be frozen to ice and then melted back to water. They froze paint cubes and tested what we could do to make them melt, making lovely pictures in the process.







## **Year 1F Solar System**

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Welcome to the Solar System! 1F had a blast making all of the planets and as you can see, have some very talented artists in the class. 'Space' has been one of the class' favourite topics.

They have orbited the sun, learnt how we get day and night, wondered about aliens, and even watched a meteor shower!

English lessons taught us all about Mae Jemison, one of many lesser-known space geniuses and even the Y1 play is about 'Space'. Watch out for awesome songs and super cool dance moves. 'Space' is amazing!





#### Year 1C Animals in the local area

The spinning took quite a bit of practice but they got the hang of it towards the end.






## **Year 3C Weaving**

Year 3 were amazed to discover that so much of the clothing we wear is woven, and not only that, the technique goes as far back as the Stone Age. The children marvelled at the designs of Kaffe Fassett, Nadine Spires and Anneke Kersten, before designing their own patterns that they wove on circular looms. The looms themselves would usually be used for embroidery but they adapted beautifully to the children creating a warp (a series of spokes) through which the children were able to weave (weft) the woollen thread of their choice.

The whole process was rather fiddly but once the children got used to the weft (weaving 'up and over' or 'under and through') they relished creating their designs and found the whole experience relaxing and deeply satisfying.





## ISA U7s Boys 5 a side Football

## **Cookery Club**


