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Headmistress's Message


The children have been incredibly busy with a lot of outdoor learning in our beautiful grounds.

Lower Kindergarten

The children in Lower Kindergarten have been learning all about different modes of transport. The children were invited down to the car park to see a real car. Miss Collins showed the children the different parts of the car including the engine, oil, water, windscreen wipers and headlights. Each child sat in the driver's seat and had a go at turning the steering wheel, all with the engine off, handbrake on and their key worker supervising! We would say the children's favourite part was pressing the car horn. This activity was a great opportunity for the child to learn new vocabulary and how parts of a vehicle work.









The children have also been introduced to the concept of 'floating and sinking'. The children were shown a variety of objects including a spoon, a rubber duck, a peg and a toy cow. They took it in turns to predict whether they thought the item would sink to the bottom or float to the top. The children enjoyed putting the objects in the water to see if their predictions were right.

The children had fun baking some yummy traffic light biscuits. They helped to stir the mixture, roll out the dough and cut out their traffic light using a special cutter. Once it was time to decorate their biscuits, we spoke about what each coloured light did. The children remembered that red means stop, orange/yellow means get ready and green means go.





Upper Kindergarten

Upper Kindergarten have been learning all about mini beasts. They were asked to draw their favourite minibeast on the school iPads or the interactive board. They had to think about what features they needed to add to their drawings such as legs, wings and feelers. They were then asked if they knew anything about their particular minibeast. The children did so well in remembering some of the facts they have learnt over the last few weeks.



Upper Kindergarten planted sunflower seeds. The children learnt what their seed would need to grow: soil, water and sunlight. First, they decorated their plant pot using mini beast pictures. Then they spooned some soil into their pot, added their sunflower seed and finally watered it. The children were very excited to take their sunflowers home to plant in their gardens.



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Reception Owls

In class we have been consolidating recall of number facts.

Working with a partner, Owls wrote down as many ways of making 5 that they could think of. They were able to use their fingers, a number line, unifix cubes or just recall learned facts. Some children also remembered they could do a 'switcheroo' for example writing 3+2=5 and then swapping the numbers to write 2+3=5.



Reception Woodpeckers

We have introduced Traditional Tales as our last topic in Reception. The children have been excited to learn about the structure of traditional tales, such as how they always start and who is the villain! Whilst exploring the topic, we read the Gingerbread Man. The Woodpeckers

then put on their own performance of the story, complete with masks! The children loved working in a team to act out the story on the outside stage.





Reception Robins

Robins class had fun learning positional language such as under, opposite, beside, over etc. First they used a block and then worked with a partner to show each position. Can you tell which word they are demonstrating?





Early Years Fathers Day Celebration

It was so lovely to welcome so many dads to school over two mornings this term in celebration of Father's Day. There was a range of outdoor activities available which included mud stencilling or painting, parachute games, an obstacle course, bug hunts, dressing up, the adventure playground, and large construction area using crates and guttering. 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Year 1V


